the white rhino is significantly larger than the black ... Carol and I also learned that first hand when we came upon a white rhino lying down ... we didn't think it was so much bigger than the black until a full grown zebra walked out from behind it! We'd never seen the zebra and it was a very large full grown one!!!



Another one of Kenya's LARGE animals is the Buffalo ... as you can see, they aren't afraid of much ... not even a <u>pack</u> of African Painted Dogs!!! Not all the animals are big. Then again, the Giraffe can grow to 18' tall making it the tallest living terrestrial animal in the world! Oh, they do "fight", but for the most part are gentle ruminants. We may see what

is called "necking" a form of fighting where they swing their necks at each other until one of them "gives"... we'll see two types of giraffes, the Rothschild, and the Maasai ... you'll notice the difference and note, like fingerprints, no two coats are the same! The Maasai coat is more jagged and darker than the Rothschild which is bright chestnut and white.
