African Elephant – Loxodonta Africana


The African Elephant is a very large herbivore having thick, almost hairless skin, a long, flexible, prehensile trunk, upper incisors forming long curved tusks of ivory, and large, fan-shaped ears. The two distinct species of African elephant are: African forest elephant (Loxodonta cyclotis) and the African bush elephant (Loxodonta Africana...



You'll be amazed watching them as they take care to make sure their babies are safe. You'll also be amazed watching those babies push the limits of the adults! You may see the juveniles and teenagers trying to spread their wings by feigning an attack ... mostly you'll just be amazed by their size, how close we are to them, how they can ignore us, and/or how they may interact with us. Remember, you're not in the zoo ... there are no cages, fences, or moats between us, and them!

NO! You cannot feed them!!! Don't even think about it! LOL!!! Just enjoy being in their presence and taking their photos. They only become aggressive when they can't see the young ones or the young ones are in trouble or being maltreated.




ACADIA TREE WITH BAR SET UP FOR "SUNDOWNERS"
